 Working on <u>Times Table Rockstars</u> - your child will have an individual login to access this. If your child works on '<u>Numbots'</u> in school, they can access this with the same login. Play on <u>Hit the Button</u> - focus on number bonds, halves and doubles Daily <u>arithmetic</u> session – focussing on digits values, partitioning and ordering – levels 3 and / or 4 Practise telling the time. This could be done through this <u>game</u> (scroll down to access the game). Read to the quarter hour progressing to nearest 5 minutes or 1 minute (analogue clock). Get a piece of paper and ask your child to show everything that they have learned in their online Maths lesson from White Rose. This could be pictures, diagrams, explanations, methods etc. They can be as creative as they want to be. <u>Daily Maths Lesson</u> The above site also has daily Maths lessons which can be accessed online. 	 You could share a story together. This could be a chapter book where you read and discuss a chapter a day. Listen to your child read and let them discuss what they have read. Encourage them to read with expression and intonation. Watch <u>Newsround</u> and discuss what is happening in the wider world. Get your child to read a book on <u>Oxford Owl</u>, discuss what your child enjoyed about the book. Explore new vocabulary you find when reading. What are the origins of this word? Can it be modified? Can you find any synonyms or antonyms for your new word? With your child, look in magazines, newspapers and books for new vocabulary they are unfamiliar with. They could use a highlighter to highlight in magazines and newspapers.

Learning Project - to be done throughout the week		
The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to gain a better understanding of their own family. Learning may focus on what different makeup of families, what traditions your family has, stories linked to your family etc.

Why not spend time looking through old photos and talking about the people in their families. What family stories can they tell? How is life different to their parents or grandparents?		
• <u>Let's Create:</u> Create a piece of artwork entitled 'Family'. This could be a drawing, a <u>self- portrait</u> , a sculpture or collage. Could they copy another artist's style? Which materials have they chosen to use and why? How do they feel about their piece of artwork? What would they change or not? <u>Family portraits</u> .		
 <u>Be Active:</u> <u>Jo Wicks-9.00 daily</u> <u>Go Noodle</u> with the family or have a family workout. Fancy a dance? There are lots of dance videos they could try. <u>Dance</u>. Maybe try some <u>Yoga</u>. <u>Recommendation at least 2 hours of exercise a week</u>. 		
• <u>Time to Talk:</u> Perhaps they could play a board game, facetime a member of their family they have not seen this week, enjoy a family indoor picnic or have a family dinner.		
• <u>Understanding Others and Appreciating Differences:</u> Discuss how their family is different to other people's families. Discuss whether all families are the same? Does it matter? Do all families have the same faith? Do all families worship in the same way?
